



Understanding How PSYPACT Works

Expanding Access to Psychological Services Across State Lines

The Psychology Interjurisdictional Compact (PSYPACT) is an interstate compact that allows licensed psychologists to practice across participating states without obtaining additional licenses in each state.

- Participating states pass PSYPACT legislation
- States join the PSYPACT Commission
- Licensed psychologists can apply for authorization to practice across state lines



Two Ways PSYPACT Supports Practice

1 APIT®

Authority to Practice Interjurisdictional Telepsychology

- For telepsychology only
- Prerequisite: ASPPB E.Passport
- Practice from your Home State
- Client is located in a participating Receiving State

Impact: Expands virtual care across PSYPACT states.

2 TAP®

Temporary Authorization to Practice

- For in-person, face-to-face services
- Prerequisite: ASPPB IPC
- Up to 30 days per state, per year
- Practice in a participating Distant State

Impact: Supports short-term, in-person services across state lines.

How PSYPACT Fits Into Service Delivery

PSYPACT creates a structured pathway that:

- ✓ Reduces licensure barriers
- ✓ Increases continuity of care when clients relocate
- ✓ Expands access to telehealth
- ✓ Supports workforce mobility
- ✓ Maintains state authority and public protection

Psychologists remain licensed in their Home State and are subject to the laws of the state where the client is located.
